It explores the process of forming a new identity in the developing multicultural urban environment of Manchester. This publication is accompanied by a DVD. Teaching material and exercises are laid out for students and teachers of Upper Primary (Year 5&6) and Secondary (Year 7-9). The pack is essentially cross curricular but provides a wealth of material for speaking and literacy, as well as extended literacy work.

His work seeks to counter clichés of these communities as hostile, directionless, passive and literature. While not disguising the fact that poverty, aggression and despair do exist he seeks to affirm the dignity, vitality, resilience and spirit he sees present in individuals and the community.
